BOARDS WATCH TEST OF P.R. VOTING DEVICE

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## Costuma Says Machine Would Save \$50,000 on Election

Members of the City Council and the Board of Estimate joined yesterday in watching a demonstration of a new proportional representation voting machine in City Hall.

David B. Costuma, Commissioner of the Board of Elections, said the new device would save \$50,000 on the cost of a P. R. election, but added that the city's investment and other expenses would run to \$500,000. The machine tabulates votes on a 10 by 4 inch card with space for the names of twenty-five candidates, and provision is also made for a write-in vote. The machines are priced at \$100 each and the city would need more than 4,000 of them.

Leo J. Langan of the Internation-

al Business Machines Company voted twelve names in 50 seconds in his demonstration. Mazie Vladeck, daughter of the late Councilman B. Charney Vladeck, tried the machine, but took 2 minutes and 40 seconds to vote ten names. George Hallett Jr. of the Citizens Union expressed his approval of the machines, but city officials were noncommittal after the demonstration.
